October 19th is CROP Walk Sunday also, and opportunities to support hungry neighbors await us. I will be returning from study leave at Princeton Seminary the Friday before, and am eager to welcome a new friend to our pulpit and walk against enemy hunger. See you in church that Sunday. Can't make the walk yourself? Support one of us walkers by pledging whatever you can.

Another authority on young adults and their faith serves here on the staff of WPC. Kathy Tureski is someone all of us know and appreciate as our youth ministries coordinator. She has a wonderful fall planned with hiking trips, beach cleanups, and traditional fun events such as the Spooky Walk. Young people will be helping to serve and clean up after World Communion as well as the CROP walk. In the 2015, we will team up to teach the confirmation class to seventh and eighth graders. I am very grateful for Kathy's leadership as we seek to be a congregation which serves every generation here at WPC.

One last but certainly not least example of young people at their best is new organist Will Roslak's inaugural recital on Thursday October 9 at 7:00 in the sanctuary. Come, bring a friend. CROP Walk 2014

If you are like me you are very wary of the many charities that keep most of the money that is donated to them, but you recognize the great worldwide need to combat hunger. There is one group I trust called Church World Service, consisting of thirtyseven denominations gathered together to help end hunger, comfort disaster survivors, help refugees, and bring lasting change to vulnerable people. Their major effort each year is the CROP Walk, supported by thousands of people like us at Westhampton Presbyterian, getting people to sponsor them financially as they walk. Last year over 2000 communities joined in 1400 walks. We raised \$1815 just in this church.

Whether you are a walker or a contributor you can be part of this great and useful effort. There are 925 million people worldwide who don't have enough to eat, and 50 million right in the U.S. Church World Services continues to invest in providing the right nutrition for children so they can grow strong and healthy, while empowering communities with skills and tools they need to make lasting changes that will feed them forever. One quarter of what we raise will come back to support our own local mission projects.

Our CROP Walk this year will be on October 19 after church and coffee hour. There will be a short walk to the duck pond and back, a half mile each way, intended for parents and small children, plus a medium length walk to St. Marks Episcopal Church and back, and a third, scenic route of five and a half miles across the two bridges and along Dune Road and back to church. Choose a route for yourself or donate to someone willing to walk one of those routes.

When the time comes, we recommend that checks be made out to Westhampton Presbyterian. We will then write one check to Church World Service. If you make your check out to CROP Walk it will go off to their headquarters and won't clear the bank for several weeks. Questions? See Stu Wood.


